

**JOHN A. RIEGEL MASONIC SCHOLARSHIP

ELIGIBILITY**

Any graduating senior pursuing further education, ministry or mission work.

CRITERIA

The criteria of masonry contemplates principles of integrity and character which can never be repudiated. Example: the three tenets of masonry:

BROTHERLY LOVE – By the exercise of brotherly love we are taught to regard the whole human species as one family, the high, the low, the rich, the poor, who, as created by one Almighty Parent and inhabitants of the same planet, are to aid, support, and protect each other. On this principle Masonry unites men of every country, sect, and opinion, and conciliates true friendship among those who might otherwise have remained at a perpetual distance.

RELIEF – To relieve the distressed is a duty of all mankind; but particularly on Masons, who are linked together by an indissoluble chain of sincere affection. To soothe the unhappy, to sympathize with their misfortune, to compassionate their miseries, and to restore peace to their troubled minds, is the grand aim we have in view.

TRUTH – Truth is a Divine attribute, and the foundation of every virtue. To be good and true is the first lesson we are taught in Masonry. On this theme we contemplate, and by its dictates, endeavor to regulate our conduct. Hence, while influenced by this principle, hypocrisy and deceit are unknown among us, and the heart and tongue join in promoting each other's welfare, and rejoicing in each other's prosperity.

Other virtues of value:

TEMPERANCE – Temperance is that due restraint upon our affections and passions, which renders the body tame and governable, and frees the mind from the allurements of vice. This virtue should be in constant practice, as he is taught to avoid excess or the contracting of any licentious or vicious habits, the indulgence in which might lead him to destruction.

FORTITUDE – Fortitude is that noble and steady purpose of mind, whereby we are enabled to undergo any pain, peril or danger, when prudentially deemed expedient. This virtue is equally distant from harshness and cowardice, and, like the former virtue, should be deeply impressed upon the mind, as a safeguard or security to our souls.

PRUDENCE – Prudence teaches us to regulate our lives and actions agreeably to the dictates of reason, and is that habit by which we wisely judge, and prudently determine, on all things relative to our present, as well as to our future happiness. This virtue should be the particular characteristic of every person for the government of his conduct when abroad in the world.

JUSTICE – Justice is that standard, or boundary, of right, which enables us to render to every man his just due without distinction. This virtue is not only consistent with divine and human laws, but is the very cement and support of civil society, and, as justice in a great measure constitutes the really good man, so should it be the invariable practice of man never to deviate from the minutest principles thereof.

It might have pleased the great Creator of heaven and earth, to have made man independent of all other beings; but as dependence is one of the strongest bonds of society, mankind were made dependent on one another for protection and security, as they thereby enjoy better opportunities for fulfilling the duties of reciprocal love and friendship. Thus was man formed for social and active life, the noblest part of the work of God; and he who will so demean himself as not to be endeavoring to add to the common stock of knowledge and understanding, may be deemed a useless member of society, and unworthy of protection.

Thus it is the Masonic question to seek such attributes in you in award of this scholarship.
